OWNERS' ATTITUDES TO THE TREATMENT OF HYPERTHYROIDISM USING ORAL ANTI-THYROID MEDICATION

SURVEY SAMPLE

The survey of 111 owners of hyperthyroid cats registered to **catprofessional.com** was conducted between 7th June and 13th August 2012 by Dr Sarah Caney BVSc PhD DSAM (Feline) MRCVS, and has been accepted for publication in the *Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery.*

The age distribution of the cats ranged from 7 years to more than 20 years, with a mean age of between 14 and 15 years. 76% of the cats in the survey were non-pedigree, short-haired cats. Slightly more males (54%) than females were recorded.

SURVEY FINDINGS

- Only 21% of owners who had experienced oral dosing of their cat described the process as either 'tricky' or 'very difficult'.
- 'Once daily treatment' was not ranked as the most important statement on dosing by any of the owners.
- 79% of cat owners are happy to pill twice a day, if needed.

SUMMARY



The survey has shown that cat owners are not a barrier to prescribing twice-daily medication. Their overwhelming drive is to provide the best level of care that they can.

From an owner perspective, the ideal anti-thyroid medication offers low doses and a variety of dosing strategies to ensure that each individual cat receives the dose they need and no more.
