Information about the last 4 weeks

1) Drinking. Do you think your dog has drunk:

2) Urinating. Do you think that the volume or frequency of urination is:

4) Vomiting and Diarrhoea. How often has your dog had sickness and diarrhoea?

- Never had sickness or diarrhoea

- Has had sickness or diarrhoea more than once but not every day
- Has had sickness or diarrhoea every day

5) Exercise. How active is your dog?

- Lays in one place nearly all of the time
- Goes for walks and will also play on occasions
- Very active, happy to run off the lead but does get tired

6) Skin and Coat. How would you describe your dog's coat and skin condition?

- Very poor (e.g. thin coat, bald patches, very dull)
- Poor (e.g. slightly thin coat, hairs dull)
- Reasonable (e.g. no bald patches, slightly dull)
- Very good (e.g. thick coat, shiny, no dandruff)

7) Other problems. Does your dog have any of the following?

- Trembling/shaking/muscle twitches more than once a week

8) General. How do you feel your pet enjoys life

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Understanding the questions

1. Drinking

This question relates to your dog's water intake over the past four weeks compared to normal. "Normal" means your dog's water intake before he/she was diagnosed with Cushing's syndrome and also, importantly, before he/she had any symptoms of the disease. Try to think back to when he/she was a young adult and compare their thirst today, to then. It may be helpful to record precisely how much water he/she is drinking over a 24 hour period on two or three separate occasions to enable you and your vet to establish a trend.

2. Urinating

This question relates to the volume of urine your dog is producing and the frequency of urination episodes over the past four weeks. "Normal" means the volume of urine produced and the frequency of urination episodes before he/she was diagnosed with Cushing's syndrome and also, importantly, before he/she had any symptoms of the disease. Try to think back to when he/she was a young adult and compare the volume of urine produced and the number of times he/she urinates per day to today.

3. Appetite

This question relates to your dog's appetite over the past four weeks. "Normal" means your dog's appetite before he/she was diagnosed with Cushing's syndrome and also, importantly, before he/she had any symptoms of the disease. Importantly, it is your dog's appetite and not the volume of food consumed that is being assessed. Try to think back to when he/she was a young adult and compare how hungry he/she was at that time to today. It may be that your dog is still being fed the same volume of food as before, but has changed with regards to the speed at which he/she consumes their food or that he/she is begging for food/treats more often than before.

4. Vomiting and Diarrhoea

This question is asking you to describe the frequency of any episodes of vomiting or diarrhoea he/she may have been over the past four weeks. Diarrhoea is defined as a change in stool consistency (softer than normal or liquid consistency).

5. Exercise

This question assesses your dog's ability to exercise over the past four weeks compared to normal. 'Normal' is defined by the duration of activity and level of exuberance prior diagnosis, and importantly, before developing symptoms, of Cushing's syndrome.

6. Skin and Coat

This question assesses the appearance (amount of hair) and condition of your dog's skin and coat over the past four weeks compared to normal. Condition means whether the coat is dull, normal or shiny and whether it is dry, normal, or greasy. "Normal" is the appearance and condition of your dog's skin and coat prior diagnosis, and importantly, before developing symptoms of Cushing's syndrome. This can be difficult to recall and it may be helpful to compare the appearance today, to photographs taken when he/she dog was a healthy adult.

7. Other problems

8. General

9. Overall

This question asks you to give an overall impression of your dog's response to trilostane (Vetoryl) therapy to date. Please compare your dog to before his/her diagnosis of Cushing's syndrome and, importantly, before he/she had any symptoms of Cushing's syndrome.

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
